IOC ACTIVITIES PRESIDENT



On 4 February, to mark one year to go until the Olympic Winter Games Beijing 2022, the IOC put athletes at the heart of celebrations by featuring their preparation and commitment to getting to the Games during these unprecedented times.

IOC President Thomas Bach formally invited the NOCs of the world and their winter sports athletes to participate in next year's Games. Given the current circumstances, this was done from Olympic House in Lausanne. The IOC President symbolically sianed and invitations to eight NOCs, including the Chinese Olympic Committee. The other seven NOCs were the Hellenic Olympic Committee, where the Olympic Games originated; the NOCs from future Olympic Games host cities - the Japanese Olympic Committee for the Olympic Games Tokyo 2020; the Comité National Olympique et Sportif Français for the Olympic Games Paris 2024; the Comitato Olimpico Nazionale Italiano for the Olympic Winter Games Milano Cortina 2026, the successor of Beijing; and the United States Olympic & Paralympic Committee for the Olympic Games Los Angeles 2028 - as well as the Australian Olympic Committee and the Nigerian Olympic Committee, which sent the largest delegations from Oceania and Africa respectively to the last Olympic Winter Games. All eight NOCs accepted the invitation via a video message.

Speaking about this milestone, President Bach said: "One year from now, Beijing will write history as the first city ever to host both the summer and winter editions of the Olympic Games. These Games will connect the Chinese people with the world." He continued: "Having seen how China is overcoming the coronavirus crisis, we are very confident that our Chinese hosts will ensure safe and secure Olympic Games in full cooperation with the IOC. Every time that I have visited China, I am so impressed by the enthusiasm and support for the Olympic Winter Games Beijing 2022. This is why, we can say already now with great confidence: China is ready. Ready to welcome the world's best winter sports athletes for unforgettable Olympic Winter Games Beijing 2022. We all are looking forward to this global celebration of sport." Read the full press release here.

President Bach also delivered a message to the athletes to whom he said: "in exactly one year from now, we will meet on the occasion of the Olympic Winter Games Beijing 2022. And we can look forward to this moment with great anticipation, because our Chinese hosts have prepared already now everything. All the venues are ready for you. And they're also taking care of a safe and secure Olympic Winter Games for every participant". IOC President concluded his video with a reassuring message to the athletes, saying: "So be confident that, when you come to Beijing in 2022, you will enjoy a safe environment, and you can look forward to a fair competition for everybody. This week. President Bach held a fruitful consultation call with the athletes' representatives. It follows calls with IOC Members, NOCs and Summer and Winter International Olympic Sports Federations. The participants expressed their broad support for the commitment of the IOC and all the stakeholders to organise safe and secure Olympic Games Tokyo 2020. The question at the heart of this consultation was not 'whether' the Games will go ahead in July, but 'how'. The participants were also given a preview of the Playbook for Athletes, which will be published in the coming days.

During a video call with the President of the International Volleyball Federation (FIVB), Ary Graça, the IOC President discussed the development and promotion of the sport (see also under "IFs"), while retaining full control of the governance and values of the sport. The preparations for the Olympic Games Tokyo 2020 were also discussed. The President also delivered a video message to their virtual Congress, telling them, "as you gather for this World Congress, I would like to congratulate FIVB for recognising the changing landscape of sport, adapting to it and innovating as a federation and as a sport."

President Bach also took part in the weekly task force meeting for the Olympic Games Tokyo 2020, which was fully concentrated on COVID countermeasures and the Playbooks that are being distributed to all stakeholders.

He also gave a video interview to the Director of the Tokyo Official Film, Naomi Kawase, discussing with her the progress of preparations for the Olympic Games Tokyo 2020.

MEMBERS

On 2 February, the IOC Executive Board (EB) rejected a complaint against the Court of Arbitration for Sport (CAS), the International Association Football Federation (FIFA) and its President, Gianni Infantino, who is also an IOC Member. The decision was made by postal vote after the EB reviewed the recommendations made by the IOC Ethics Commission. Read the full press release here.

OTHER OLYMPIC NEWS

On 3rd February, the IOC, the International Paralympic Committee (IPC) and the Tokyo 2020 Organising Committee (Tokyo 2020) published the first Playbook, a resource which outlines the personal responsibilities key stakeholders must take to play their role in ensuring sage and successful Olympic and Paralympic Games this summer. The series of Playbooks provide a framework of basic principles that each key stakeholder group will follow before they travel to Japan, when entering Japan, during their time at the Games and when leaving the Games. They will provide direction and set parameters that will enable people and organisations to advance their planning at this stage. Read the full news release here.

SUMMER IFS



The official draw for the Tokyo 2020 Olympic women's and men's basketball competitions took place on 2 February at the **International Basketball Federation** (FIBA)

headquarters, the Patrick Baumann House of Basketball. Twenty-four teams, 12 men's and 12 women's, will take part in the competition, starting on 25 July in Tokyo. See the results of the two draws here. In addition, the FIBA Descriptive Analytics Report 2020, produced by FIBA and the World Association of Basketball Coaches (WABC), has been published. The report looks into team and individual player analysis at the most recent FIBA events at international level. Through collaboration with the NBA, comparative analysis with WNBA and NBA analytics has also been included. More details here.



The International Canoe Federation (ICF) has produced a book entitled "Parc Olímpic del Segre" (Del Segre

Olympic Park), which focuses on the canoe slalom venue at the Olympic

Games Barcelona 1992. Written by Ramon Ganyet Solé, who was the venue manager during these Games, the book analyses the experience of 30 years of this Pyrenean facility as a model of a sustainable approach to developing and spreading white water canoeing. The ICF plans

The Management Committee of the **Union Cycliste**

After the success of the <u>FINA</u> women's water polo Olympic Games <u>qualification tournament</u> in Trieste (Italy) in January, which was held in a COVID-safe bubble, the

International Swimming Federation (FINA) has announced that the men's water polo Olympic Games qualification tournament will be held in Rotterdam (Netherlands) from 14 to 21 February 2021. Twelve teams will vie for the last three Olympic spots to join Serbia, Italy, Spain, the USA, Australia, Hungary, South Africa, Kazakhstan and hosts Japan this summer in Tokyo. The International Volleyball Federation (FIVB) and CVC Capital Partners Fund VII have announced the launch of Volleyball World, a new partnership which will drive

innovation, growth and investment in volleyball around the globe. Volleyball World will become the commercial entity for the sport around the world, initially for the FIVB and later looking to work alongside other leagues and federations, with the goal of increasing the profile and popularity of the sport, through fresh investment for the benefit of fans, players and national federations. NATIONAL OLYMPIC COMMITTEES



The aim of the agreement is to support ENSJSI students with work placements at the COA and educational training in the field of sport and Olympism. ORGANISING COMMITTEES FOR THE OLYMPIC GAMES BEIJING 2022



On 4 February, the Organising Committee for the Olympic Winter Games Beijing 2022 revealed its Olympic torch design (photo) during an event marking one year to go until the Games begin. The torch was presented during a ceremony held in the iconic Beijing 2008 Summer Games venue, the National Aquatics Centre, which has been transformed into the "Ice Cube" for next year's Winter Games curling competition.

The winning design, selected from 182 entries in a global competition launched back in April 2020, was commended by Beijing 2022's judges for its combination of Chinese aesthetic values, traditional cultural connotations and advanced technology. With the support of the Ministry of Education and the French sports movement. the SOP is a key element of the education programme of the Organising Committee for the Olympic and Paralympic Games Paris 2024.
